'Dean of W.Va. Songwriters' Todd Burge to Play Twice at MCTA



Witty singer-songwriter and guitarist Todd Burge returns to Mountain City Traditional Arts, 25 E. Main St., Frostburg, on **Saturday**, **April 30**, for a children's concert at 4 p.m. and a concert for his adult fans at 7:30 p.m. Both events are free and open to the public, with a suggested donation of \$15.

Over the past three decades, Burge has become known as one of West Virginia's greatest singer-songwriters. The self-styled troubadour draws musical inspiration from a rich tapestry of life experiences, weaving humor and socially conscious lyrics with immense talent. Burge's musical style varies from folk to alternative rock

and beyond. Many of his songs are performed from unexpected perspectives, including bugs, animals and inventive human characters of Burge's imagination.

Burge's 2015 album, "Imitation Life," was produced in collaboration with Grammy winner Tim O'Brien, and his newest album, "Live on Mountain State 2006-2015," featuring recordings across a decade of live performances on NPR, will be released in May.

University Chorale and Chamber Singers Spring Choral Concert

Join the FSU Chamber Singers and the University Chorale as they present their spring choral concert, "A Choral Fantasy," on **Sunday, May 8**, at 3 p.m. The concert will feature many works examining the themes of love, peace and brotherhood.

Under the direction of *Dr. James Reddan*, and accompanied by *Dr. Jay Dewire*, the FSU University Chorale will begin the concert with an American classic, "Zion's Walls" by Aaron Copland. This will be followed by the "Neighbor's Chorus" (Offenbach) conducted by student conductor *Alexa Bashaw*. The chorale will then perform "Under the Willow Tree" from the opera "Vanessa" by American composer Samuel Barber. This will be followed by "Sure on This Shining Night" by Morten Lauridsen and finish with the traditional spiritual "Wade in the Water" by Moses Hogan.

The FSU Chamber Singers will perform a varied repertoire of choral works, beginning with "Dúlamán" by Michael McGlynn as performed by Anuna in the traditional Gaelic. This will be followed by "Tanzen und Springen" by Hans Leo Hassler and Arvo Pärt's "Bogoróditse Djévo," the Russian version of the "Hail Mary" with a twist. Following these pieces, the ensemble will perform "Good Night Dear Heart" (Forest) based on the epitaph of Susy Clemens, the daughter of Mark Twain, and the choral standard "Sing Me to Heaven" (Gawthrop). The ensemble will next perform "Let All the World in Every Corner Sing" by British composer Ralph Vaughan Williams under the direction of student conductor *Katelyn Hendrix*. The Chamber Singers will round out their performance with "Exultate Justi" (Viadana), "Ubi Caritas" (Gjeilo) and a new work by American composer Jake Runestad, "Alleluia."

The final part of the afternoon will feature the performance of Ludwig van Beethoven's "Choral Fantasia, Op. 80." This medium-sized work is a piano concerto with a choral ending that served as the precursor for Beethoven's Ninth Symphony. This will feature DeWire on piano, the orchestra and the combined choirs.

Tickets will be available for purchase at the door and are \$5 for general admission, \$3 for students and free for children 12 and younger.

Theatre and Dance Presents Dance Concert 'Emergence'



The FSU Department of Theatre and Dance's spring 2016 dance concert will come to the stage **Friday**, **May 6**, and **Saturday**, **May 7**, at 7:30 p.m. in the PAC Drama Theatre. Titled "Emergence," the concert showcases the eclectic work of student choreographers and designers. Under the guidance of FSU faculty members *Jamie McGreevy*, *Brian Scruggs* and *Michele Labar*, the concert will feature energetic dances in the styles of hip-hop, tap, contemporary, ballet and "voquing."

Highlighting the vitality of personal and stylistic diversity, the concert grew from the original work of nine emerging choreographers during the spring semester.

Graduating senior *Madeleine Bohrer* will present a picturesque duet called "New Beginnings" as her final contribution to the FSU Dance Company, while a piece by *Yazmin Bush* focuses on losing yourself in the day-to-day obstacles thrown at you in life.

A vibrant voguing battle scene by **Shaiday Dancy** serves as a tribute to DMV Models Inc., and **Deion Dawodu**'s choreography embodies the struggle of breaking away from toxic relationships. A piece by **Mariah Goldring** explores what it means to break social norms in today's society.

Second-time choreographer *Krysten Gutrich* created a dance about appearances and *Sarah Polkabla*'s "Limitless" signifies the unlimited boundary that surrounds creativity in the world of dance. *Alex Stewart*'s choreography reflects on the ways negative energy holds a person back and the importance of positive energy to bring everyone back. Finally, *Anecia Whitehead* will present an emotional piece dedicated to loved ones "while on the road to heaven and eternity."

Early in the creative process, these choreographers teamed up with lighting and costume designers to implement their vision into a fully realized performance. Jennifer Grein, Shawn Zupancic, Austin Hueg, Kim Lartz, Rachel Saylor and Brian M. Scruggs collaborated on lighting designs, and Rachel Saylor, Alejandro Portillo Romero, Habtamu Anderson and Michele Labar created costumes designs. The show will be stage-managed by Rebekah Brown.

"The student choreographers have been working really hard to hone in on their individual creative process. It has been really exciting to witness their discoveries and journey. That is one of the most awesome parts of my position as director. ... I have the chance to watch these young artists develop their own creative voices and unique selves," McGreevy said.

Final Watershed Moments Talk – Glaciologist/Geologist Dr. Richard Alley

The University of Maryland Center for Environmental Science's Appalachian Laboratory will present Dr. Richard Alley, a celebrated glaciologist and geologist from Penn State, on **Thursday, May 12**, at 6 p.m. in FSU's Performing Arts Center. His presentation, "Powering the Future: Good News in the Greenhouse," will be the final spring Watershed Moments event.

Alley has ranged from Antarctica to Greenland to help learn the history of Earth's climate, and whether the great ice sheets will fall in the ocean and flood our coasts. With more than 250 scientific publications, he has been asked to provide advice to the highest levels of government, and has been recognized with numerous awards, including election to the U.S. National Academy of Sciences and the Royal Society. The Western Maryland Section of the American Chemical Society and its FSU student members will host "Moldy Milieu: Exploring the Mycrobiome – or Fungi – of Your Home" on Wednesday, April 27, from 5:30 to 7 p.m. in Compton 224. This event is free and open to the public.

The term "mycobiome" refers to the community of different fungal species, including molds, yeast and

mushrooms, that live in an environment. In this presentation, *Dr. Catherine Vrentas*, an assistant professor in FSU's Department of Biology, will share the story of the fungi that inhabit homes – both helpful and potentially harmful – and the array of interesting chemicals they produce.

Dr. Xunyu Pan Presents Research on Mobile Music Visualization at Electronic Imaging Conference

Dr. Xunyu Pan, an assistant professor in FSU's Department of Computer Science and Information Technologies, recently presented a research paper titled "Musical Instruments Simulation on Mobile Platform" at the 28th Electronic Imaging Conference in San

Francisco. In the article, co-authored by FSU graduate students **Megan Balukoff** and **Jacob Wilson**, the authors introduce a novel mobile musical system aiming to simulate the functionality of musical instruments and visualize the interaction between simulating devices and mobile users. The paper was based on a collaboration with Purdue University.

The latest research on digital imaging and multimedia systems is presented at the Electronic Imaging Conference. Topics cover all aspects of imaging and multimedia system, from computational photography to virtual reality technologies used in science, communication, security, transportation, education, entertainment and space exploration. This is the third time Pan and his students have presented at the conference.

FSU Ed.D. Candidates Paving Smoother Road From High School to College

Four candidates from FSU's inaugural Doctor of Education cohort in Hagerstown have published an important paper in "Colleges & University Journal," a publication of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers.

"Paving the Road for Student Success: Building a Case for Integrated Strategic Planning" aims to clear the path from high school to college. The candidates brought significant practical experience to bear on the issue.

Jarrett Kealey is assistant director in the Office of Undergraduate Education at UMBC. Renee Peterson has worked as a full-time high school English teacher for the past two decades. Angela Thompson is the senior business analyst of the Office of the Registrar at UMUC. Kristin Waters is the associate director of operations for Undergraduate Admissions at UMBC.

Their thesis was straightforward: To best smooth students' transitions, K-12 and higher-education administrators must come together in joint strategic planning sessions.

Over half of students entering two-year colleges and about 20 percent of students entering four-year universities require remedial courses. To reduce the time and cost of a degree, leaders from both educational sectors must collaborate to ensure high school graduates are prepared for college coursework.

The candidates suggest creating "transition centers," which would serve high school students as they consider college choices and prepare their applications.

They also recommend creating a unified student information system, which would let administrators track students before entering and after leaving an institution. That information should help administrators identify and eliminate other undiscovered obstacles on the road to college.
