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
FSU Ranked in Most Affordable Colleges for Incoming Freshmen With Financial Need

FSU was ranked among the Most Affordable Colleges nationwide for incoming freshmen with financial need. The ranking came from the Student Loan Report, from studentloans.net, an organization that helps students make smart financial decisions about student loans.

The Student Loan Report analyzed more than 1,000 college and universities and narrowed the report down to the top 250; FSU was ranked 228. Schools are ranked based on the percentage of freshmen with financial need multiplied by the average amount given to the freshmen in financial need. This yields an adjusted ranking for the college's overall ability to provide aid to those freshmen.

According to the Student Loan Report's data, pulled from Peterson's Financial Aid Data, 73 percent of FSU first-year students receive financial aid, with the average award being \$7,658.

CES at FSU Presents Tibetan Monks Residency – The Mystical Arts of Tibet



Buddhist monks of the Drepung Loselang Monastery have returned to FSU for a residency endorsed by His Holiness the Dalai Lama. The purpose of the residency, which takes place **through Thursday**, **March 9**, is to promote world peace and healing through sacred performing arts.

Events include a public performance of "Sacred Music, Sacred Dance," which combines traditional multiphonic chanting, sacred music and dance, and colorful costumes, on **March 9** at 7:30 p.m. in PAC

Pealer Recital Hall. Tickets are \$24 for adults and \$21.60 for youth under 17. Corporate and group discount rates are also available.

The residency also includes the creation of a mandala sand painting and many free lectures and workshops on Tibetan philosophy, art, meditation and culture led by the monks' spiritual leader Geshe Lobsang Tenzin Negi.

Creation of the Mandala



A highlight of the project is the creation of a mandala sand painting in FSU's Lewis J. Ort Library. Community members are invited to observe as the monks lay millions of grains of colored sand onto a flat platform to form the image of a mandala.

The process of sand painting is one of Buddhism's most exquisite artistic traditions. Millions of grains of sand are painstakingly laid on a flat platform over a period of days to form the image of a mandala. Over the years, the monks have created sand paintings in more than 100 museums, art centers and universities throughout the United States and Europe.

The process is said to effect purification and healing on three levels. The outer level represents the world in its divine form, the inner level represents a map by which the ordinary human mind is transformed into enlightenment and the secret level depicts the balance of the subtle energies of the body and the clear light dimension of the mind.

After the opening ceremony when the lamas consecrated the site; called forth the forces of goodness through chanting, music and mantra recitation; and drew an outline of the mandala on the wooden platform, they will continue to lay colored sands through traditional metal funnels called chakpurs. Observation hours are Monday through Wednesday from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Thursday from 10 a.m. to noon.

A closing ceremony will be held on **March 9** at noon. Traditionally, sand mandalas are destroyed shortly after completion. This is done as a metaphor for the impermanence of life. First, the sands are swept up and placed in an urn. To fulfill the function of healing, half is distributed to the audience while the remainder is carried to a nearby body of water to be scattered. The water then carries the healing blessing to the ocean; from there it spreads throughout the world for planetary healing.

Lectures and Workshops

March 6 events include a lecture at noon, "Opening the Heart: Arousing the Mind of Universal Kindness," to explore the mental archetypes of love and kindness, as well as an interfaith dialogue, dinner and lecture, "The Psychology of Enlightenment," starting at 6 p.m. to discuss the conscious development of health and stability.

Events on **March 7** include a noon lecture, "The Ancient Art of Healing: The Tibetan Buddhist Approach," which explores ancient approaches to healing through meditation, mantras and visualizations, and a 6 p.m. workshop, "Basic Meditation Techniques for Health and Clarity."

March 8 events include a noon lecture, "Meditation: A Tool for Conscious Living," and a workshop at 7 p.m., "Tibetan Meditations for Eliminating Stress and Anxiety."

Workshops are 90 minutes in length and lectures are 60 minutes. Activities will be held in the Lane Atkinson Room (232). All are free and open to the public.

Dr. Mark Gallagher and West Shore Piano Trio in Faculty Artist Series Concert

FSU's Department of Music will present *Dr. Mark Gallagher* and the West Shore Piano Trio in a Faculty Artist Series concert on **Sunday, March 12**, at 3 p.m. Gallagher will play the clarinet. The West Shore Piano Trio is comprised of *Dr. Jay DeWire* on piano, Heather Haughn on the violin and Diana Flesner on the cello. The group will be joined by the *Rev. Martha Macgill*.

The musicians will play "Quatuor pour la fin du Temps" ("Quartet for the End of Time") by Olivier Messiaen.

Messiaen was a prisoner of war in 1941 at Stalag VIII-A in Görlitz, Germany (now Zgorzelec, Poland). While there, he wrote a short trio for the clarinetist Henri Akoka, violinist Jean le Boulaire and cellist Étienne Pasquier; this piece developed into the Quatuor for the same trio with himself at the piano. The composition premiered at the camp for an audience of about 400 fellow prisoners and guards on Jan. 15, 1941, and is considered one of the most significant chamber music works of the 20th century.

The performance of the quartet on **March 12** will be the culmination of Gallagher's research trip to the Meeting Point Messiaen Institute, located at the site of the original Stalag VIII-A prisoner-of-war camp.

The FSU Department of Music will present Vocal Studio Recitals on **Monday, March 13**, and **Tuesday, March 14**; both will be at 7:30 p.m. Students from the studios of *Tory Browers* and *Lawren Hill* will present one or two pieces each, covering a wide range of composers, styles and periods. The singers will be accompanied by pianist *Joseph Yungen*.

Lyra Ensemble Next in Woodwind Quartet-a-Month Series

The FSU Department of Music will present the Lyra Ensemble as part of its Woodwind Quartet-a-Month series on **Wednesday**, **March 29**, at 7:30 p.m. Members of the ensemble are Dr. Kristin Bacchiocchi-Stewart, on flute, alto flute and piccolo; Ellen Fisher-Deerberg, on flute and bass flute; Anna Meyer, on flute and piccolo; and Dr. Elivi Varga, on flute.

The quartet will begin with "Sinfonia" from "The Marriage of Figaro" by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. This will be followed by several modern pieces, beginning with "An Gaelic Tiodhlac" ("A Gaelic Offering") by Catherine McMichael, which consists of four Gaelic pieces in traditional style – rowdy, raw and rambunctious when fast, and achingly personal when slow. The ensemble will then perform "Four 'Scapes" by Cynthia Folio, consisting of "Cityscape," "Seascape," "Landscape" and "Escape" and "Trois Pièces pour quatre Flûtes en Ut" by Eugène Bozza, a French contemporary composer and violinist and a prolific composer of chamber music for wind instruments.

After intermission, the group will continue with "Urban Ragas" by Till Maclvor Meyn, which is reminiscent of ragas, the scales and modes of Indian music; "Quatuor de Flûtes" by Jean-Michel Damase; and "Steeley Pause" by Jennifer Higdon.

Theatre and Dance Stages Cutting-edge New 'American Odyssey,' 'Father Comes Home From the Wars'

FSU's Department of Theatre and Dance will open its spring season with an explosive new drama by Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright Suzan-Lori Parks, "Father Comes Home From the Wars, Parts 1, 2 and 3." This first installment of a new "American Odyssey" is set during the American Civil War and will be performed Thursday through Saturday, March 9 to 11, at 7 p.m. and at a matinee on Sunday, March 12, at 2 p.m. The

play, presented in F. Perry Smith Studio Theatre of the Performing Arts Center, is recommended for ages 14 and older.

Written by the author of "Topdog/Underdog," the action-style play follows Hero, a slave, who must decide between joining his master on the Confederate battlefield – for what may or may not be a chance to gain his freedom – or staying behind on the plantation with the woman and people he loves. Infused with music and contemporary wit, "Father Comes Home From the Wars" is a high-stakes drama about the mess of war, the cost of freedom and the pain of love, with all three parts seen in one night. It is directed by *Nicole Mattis*, an associate professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance.

Author Russell Shorto Examines Dutch Contribution to American Identity



FSU will present "From Amsterdam to New Amsterdam," a lecture by bestselling author, historian and journalist Russell Shorto, on **Thursday, March 9**, at 7 p.m. in Gira Center 397. The event is free and open to the public.

Shorto will explore the outsized influences of the Dutch city of Amsterdam on America's history, values and culture. Long renowned as one of the world's most liberal cities, Amsterdam exported its ideals of cultural tolerance and free trade to America's shores more than a century before the American Revolution.

An established authority on Dutch-American history, Shorto has lectured on the subject to the New York Historical Society, the Chicago Council on Global Affairs and universities around the country.

Shorto, who moved to Cumberland to do historical research, has written five books that have won multiple awards and been published in 14 languages, including the 2004 New York Times bestseller, "The Island at the Center of the World," and "Amsterdam: A History of the World's Most Liberal City," in 2013. His sixth, "Revolution Song: A Story of American Freedom," will be published in the fall. He is a regular contributor to The New York Times Magazine and his writing has appeared in The New Yorker.

Shorto previously lived in Amsterdam, where he directed the John Adams Institute. In 2009, he received a Dutch knighthood in the Order of Orange-Nassau for his services in strengthening Dutch-American relations.



Christopher Gill Presents Encrypted Chat Program at Intl. Conference

Technology companies specializing in instant messaging are always looking at ways to make their applications more secure. FSU computer science major *Christopher Gill* of Leonardtown is already building a product that helps evolve existing chat applications.

Gill, who built a desktop prototype application for group multimedia instant messaging with real-time attribute-based encryption, recently presented his project at the Society for Imaging Science and Technology International Symposium on Electronic Imaging near San Francisco.

The senior's application features encrypted messaging on each user's device, designed not to be captured by a server. Having the security of the messages rest on the user/client side – on one's smartphone, tablet or computer – reduces the chances of a middleman intercepting the messages. The downside to this method is a slower delivery time.

Encrypted chat applications are on the market now, including WhatsApp. What makes his different from WhatsApp is that WhatsApp encrypts on both the client end and through servers because the scale of their operations must serve millions of messages quickly. WhatsApp does the filtering through its servers to figure out where an encrypted message should go. Gill's app has the smartphone or other device perform that sorting, which contributes to the lag time.

Few studies have been done on user-end security in group chats.

Gill's program also allows users to assign their contacts to groups to allow a group chat based on an interest or topic, like work, sports, family or friends. Making group conversations easier to manage is an improvement over existing applications.

If Gill would develop his application for commercial use, he said he would need to build a smarter, more secure server that can more efficiently forward the correct messages, enable the ability for encrypted multimedia and live video, integrate the app with existing social media, plus make a sleek-looking user interface for smartphones.

Gill was motivated to pursue this undergraduate research project by FSU Computer Science Assistant Professor *Dr. Xunyu Pan*, who entreats students in his Multimedia and Internet Communication course to research technologies that interest them and find a way to improve on existing technology.

The most-developed project from Pan's class is recommended for presentation at the international conference, where students can network with Silicon Valley players and graduate schools.

Gill plans to use his skills to find a technology security job in the Washington, D.C., market and, ultimately, land a dream job for a top firm in California.

Andy Duncan Is Guest Speaker at GW



Chris Williams Selected as AAAS Science and Technology Policy Fellow



Chris Williams '06 was recently selected for the 44th class of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Science and Technology Policy Fellows. Williams completed undergraduate research as part of the McNair Program while at FSU. He went on to complete a doctorate in biology in 2012 at Georgetown University, where he studied the regulation of gene expression in the intestinal parasite "Giardia lamblia." Next, he went to the National Institutes of Health, where he was a postdoctoral fellow in the Laboratory of Biochemistry and Genetics in the National Institute of Diabetes, Digestive and Kidney Diseases. While there, he studied fertilization and reproduction in the worm "C. elegans." Beyond his passion for research, Williams

Annual FSU International Playwriting Competition Opens for Submissions

The FSU Center for Literary Arts is accepting submissions for its eighth annual international One-Act Playwriting Competition. The competition remains open for submissions through **Friday**, **April 7**.

The winning playwright will receive a prize of \$750 and a full-stage production of his or her play during Frostburg's annual One-Act Play Festival in **September** at the Palace Theatre in downtown Frostburg. Second- and third-place playwrights will respectively receive prizes of \$250 and \$100, and their plays will have staged readings during the One-Act Play Fest.

Plays are judged based on plot, character development, dialogue and overall writing quality. Eligible plays may not have been produced prior to submission, must have runtimes of 40 minutes or less and can feature a maximum of eight actors. Staging and technical needs should be simple, and a character list with brief physical descriptors should be included.

Entries must include three bound copies of the play postmarked no later than **April 7**. The author's name may not appear anywhere on the work, and a cover letter should be affixed with the name of the play, the author's address and contact information, a brief synopsis of the play and a brief biography.

Before submitting an entry, playwrights should carefully review all submission guidelines. Submissions that are incomplete or fail to follow guidelines will be disqualified.

Playwrights may submit a maximum of two plays. Each entered play must include a check for \$20, made payable to Frostburg State University, with One-Act Competition written in the memo line. FSU to Offer Summer Music Academy for Classical Music

FSU will host its second annual Summer Music Academy from Saturday, July 22, through Saturday, July 29, featuring guest instructors and artists from top musical ensembles. The academy promotes classical music education, and the goal is to develop individual musicianship for string, woodwind, brass and piano instrumentalists in a supportive environment.

Those who are ages 14 and up are encouraged to enroll. All skill levels are welcome.

During the one-week workshop, each attendee will experience instruction from world-renowned guest artists, including members of the Vienna Philharmonic, Canadian Brass, Boston Symphony Orchestra and National Symphony Orchestra, as well as FSU Music Department faculty members. The academy will be no larger than 60 students.

Academy activities will feature masterclasses, evening faculty performances, chamber music coaching, the Alexander Technique and exposure to internationally renowned musicians, soloists and teachers, as well as outdoor activities in the setting of the Allegheny Mountains.

Faculty are not only accomplished performers, but are also skilled instructors.

Violinist Johnathan Carney is in his 15th season with the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra. Carney serves as artistic director for the Maryland Classic Youth Orchestras. Joe Burgstaller, trumpeter, tours worldwide as a soloist as well as a clinician with his groundbreaking masterclasses for all instruments.
